Chaplain's Message: Fr. Marcel E. Okwara, CSsR



Dear brother Knights,

In these words of the great St. Paul of Tarsus, "I do not do the good I want, but I do the evil I do not want.... Miserable one that I am! Who will deliver me from

this mortal body? Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord" we hear one of the most descriptive and indisputable conditions of the human person. I tell you, no one can reasonably dispute those words of St. Paul. Majority of people, I believe, want to do good, but as hard as we try, in the end, we find ourselves doing what we do not want to do. Sometimes I fight with myself, and I ask myself, "What's wrong with me? Why did I do it? Why can't I stand uninterruptedly upright?" If that is also your sentiment, read again these words from St. Paul: "For I do not do the good I want, but I do the evil I do not want."

But didn't the Book of Genesis tell us that we are made in imago Dei (image of God)? Yes indeed! God made us in his own image, which is love. However, we have it within ourselves the impulse, the tendency, the deep pull to selfishness, to greed, to self-satisfaction, to self-sufficiency, to pride, to overinflate our ego and to sin, which is a rejection of God's invitation to friendship. This is the struggle and battle that goes on within each of us. One day, we rise, another day we fall. One day, we are amazing, another day, we are dreadful. One day, we are lovely, another day, everyone around us is avoiding us. One day, we love, another day, we are full of hate. One day, we reach out, another day, we retreat and build walls. One day, we pray, another day, we curse. One day, we build, another day, we find ourselves destroying what has taken us a lot to build. Just look around you and see what's going on in the world. Many of us really want to love God, we want to love our neighbor because of God. But we struggle to do what we want to do. This is the mystery of the human condition.

Oftentimes Christians are accused of hyperstressing sin, of being over preoccupied with guilt and the weakness of our human condition: "Stop talking about human weakness. Stop focusing on human frailty. Talk about human achievement, the progress in science, technology, humanities etc." many say. Has the human race made progress in science and technology? Yes! Many years ago, it took months to move from Europe to Africa. Today, it takes just a few hours. No doubt, there has been so much progress made in so many fields of life. But despite these advancements and accomplishments, the one human phenomenon we have not been able to alter is "I do not do the good I want, but I do the evil I do not want." We are yet to invent and produce tools, therapies, equipment that can enable us to do the good we want to do and avoid the evil we do not want to do. We still struggle with this human condition today just as the great St. Paul did many centuries ago. No scientific or technological evolution has solved this downward tendency to selfishness. No philosophical theory and framework has provided a definitive solution to this mystery. More to it, without a healthy and balanced sense of our sinfulness, we cannot see any need for redemption from sin. And without a sense of sin, we won't see any need for redemption from sin. As a consequence, we won't see any need for God.

What's the bottom line? There is finally a place for God. God will always be part of the human equation even as we try so hard to ignore God and to kick God out of our lives. Check this out! God is that which we cannot possibly ignore. God will always be part of the discussion. In fact, God is the end of the discussion. Unless we surrender to God totally, the discussion continues. Until we give God his prime place, the confusion continues, our weakness grows, our division intensifies, our recklessness and dysfunction deepens.

Are we totally helpless? Not at all! Undeniably, St. Paul acknowledges his own miserableness: "*Miserable one that I am!*" He realizes his struggle

and his inability to do the good he wants to do. Although he is a good and faithful Jew, he admits his best effort is not good enough. Then cries out: "Who will deliver me from this mortal body?" Science? Technology? Philosophy? Religion? Wealth? Power? More pleasure? Honor? Country? Tribe? Academic degrees? Arms and military might? Rigid obedience to law? Not at all! Mind you, all these are good in themselves but none is able to deliver St. Paul or anybody from the downward tendency to sin and selfishness. Who will deliver St. Paul? Who will set us free? Where will our salvation come from? Paul answers, "Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ"

our Lord." Only God through Jesus Christ can save us. Finally, no one can pay his or her own ransom. Your salvation, my salvation is beyond us. Only Jesus can save. If you are still wondering why you should give your life to God, this is it. This is the reason why God must be central in our life.

Veni Sancte Spiritus!
